H.A. Ripley: A Comprehensive Biography

Basic Information

- **Full Name:** Harold Austin Ripley (known as "Rip" or "Austin")

Career as a Writer

Syndicated Columnist

Ripley worked as a syndicated newspaper columnist for the Chicago Tribune, writing a daily column called "Minute Mysteries" featuring Professor Fordney that appeared in more than 100 newspapers. English teachers found these short mysteries helpful in teaching inferential thinking and reading for details, making them productive to start each day with.

"Minute Mysteries" Book

Published in 1932 by Houghton Mifflin Company, the book featured 71 short detective puzzles. Harold Austin Ripley created this timeless puzzle book presenting intriguing mysteries in a concise, engaging format.

"Photo Crime" Feature

Ripley conceived a new feature called "Photo Crime," starring detective Hannibal Cobb who solved hundreds of cases based on one or more photographs combined with sparse paragraphs that held clues for readers of Look Magazine to solve in every issue.

Research Methods

Ripley loved detective stories so much that when he lived in Chicago, he rode in police squad cars daily looking for material.

Career Start

Ripley began his career as a Congressional page, working for the U.S. Speaker of the House in Washington, D.C.

Personal Life

First Marriage

Ripley was married first in the early 1920s to character actress Mabel Ida Albertson, which only lasted a few years. They were married from 1924-1928 and had two children:

- **Patricia Julia Ripley** (born February 16, 1925), who became an actress known as Pat Englund
- **George Howe Ripley** (born June 22, 1926), who became film director and producer George Englund (he took his stepfather's surname)

Second Marriage

Ripley met his second wife Leone M. Johannes while she was working at the Chicago Tribune, and married her in December 1933.

Move to Wisconsin

Ripley came to Wisconsin in 1938 and settled in Dunn County where he built a cabin overlooking upper Tainter Lake. He also kept an office in Eau Claire where he did much of his writing in the winter months.

Recovery and Life's Work

Alcoholism and Recovery

Ripley achieved considerable celebrity as a writer in the 1930s and 40s, even while sliding into alcoholism and despair. He joined Alcoholics Anonymous in 1942 when that fellowship was still small and embraced its principles with an enthusiasm that never wavered.

While drinking, Ripley came across a copy of the Saturday Evening Post and discovered an article featuring Alcoholics Anonymous. The article described how this young organization helped alcoholics achieve and maintain sobriety. As a result, Ripley began his journey of recovery through Alcoholics Anonymous, devoting a good deal of the ensuing year in conversations with Bill W. and Dr. Bob, the founders of AA.

Guest House Foundation

A chance meeting with a priest in a bar led him to discover that priests were joining AA but failing to achieve sobriety. Because the AA program was working so well for others, Rip made a special effort to find ways of helping priests.

On May 20, 1956, Ripley's dream became a reality when the doors of Guest House opened to care for priests and seminarians suffering from alcoholism. The first location was in Lake Orion, Michigan, in the historic Scripps Mansion. A second location opened in Rochester, Minnesota in 1969.

It is estimated he helped more than 9,000 alcoholic Catholic priests at Guest House centers during his lifetime.

His Philosophy

Guest House was founded on Ripley's profound belief that his program should "save the individual; save the vocation," and in precisely that order.

Final Years

Austin Ripley slowly began to lose his eyesight and went completely blind two years before his death. He died at home in his cabin he built on Tainter Lake.

Legacy

Guest House continues to operate today, having expanded to serve both men and women religious. The organization remains true to Ripley's vision of providing dignified, specialized treatment for Catholic clergy and religious suffering from addiction.

His "Minute Mysteries" book remains in print and continues to be used in classrooms, with the book available in multiple formats and enjoying renewed interest as a classic puzzle collection.

Notes on Images

Book Cover Description
